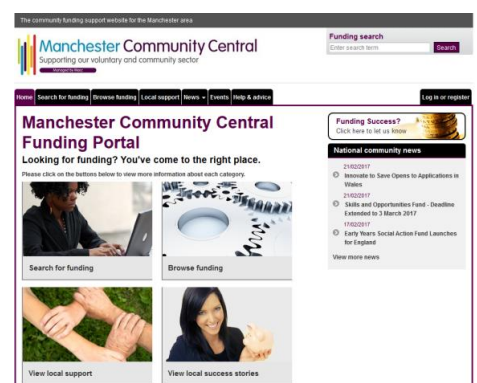

VCSE organisations working outside of the City of Manchester, consultants, sole traders, statutory bodies, private businesses and infrastructure organisations who become members of Macc aren't eligible to access our funding portal. Aims/priorities: Ford Britain Trust is committed to supporting the communities they work and live in. That is why they have created the Ford Britain Trust in April 1975 to help fund the education and advancement of their neighbours. Ford Britain Trust pay special attention to projects focusing on education, environment, children, the disabled, youth activities and projects that provide clear benefits to the local communities close to their UK locations, which includes Manchester. The Ford Britain Trust particularly encourages applications from Ford employees, but is open to all, provided that the qualifying organisations meet their selection criteria. Grant applications supporting the following activities will be considered:

- Work that has clear benefits to the local community / environment
- Work with young people / children
- Education / schools (mainstream)
- Special education needs
- People with disabilities

Who can apply? Registered charities; schools / PTAs (non-fee paying, state sector schools only; independent/private, fee paying, schools will not be considered); non-profit organisations (including small clubs and societies)

Grant amount: Small grants of up to £250 and Large grants between £250 – £5,000 are available

Greater Manchester Walking Festival

Aims/priorities: Greater Manchester Walking Festival are offering small grants to community groups working in targeted areas. Using the joy and fun approach, the festival aims to celebrate walking, places to walk and people to walk with, and appeal to a range of audiences. It is expected that walks will be offered across the whole of Greater Manchester and there will be a varied mix of 'interest' walks.

Who can apply? Youth groups, friends of groups, sports clubs, faith groups, social clubs or local charities can apply to plan a walk that will appeal to your community, and may encourage people who are not regularly active or are inactive to take part.

Grant amount: Grants include: £250 per walk, or £500 if walking is offered as a key part offered as part of a wider community event

Greater Manchester Walking Grants

Aims/priorities: The Greater Manchester Walking Grants are provided by the Greater Manchester Health and Social Care Partnership and administered by the Greater Manchester Centre for Voluntary Organisation (GMCVO). The funding is intended to create a network of people and organisations in Greater Manchester who promote and support walking in creative ways.

Who can apply? Grants are available for voluntary and community groups and social enterprises in Greater Manchester for projects that encourage people who are usually less active to get out and start walking or increase the amount they walk.

Grant amount: Small grants are between £50 – £1,000 and medium grants are between £1,000 – £5,000 as well as partnership grants of up to £15,000

Application process: If you want to apply for a grant you will need to fill in a short online application form with information about your organisation, what you would like to do, what you would spend the funding on and who will benefit from your project.

Deadline: Grants will be awarded on an ongoing basis with a decision usually given within three weeks

Heart of the Community Fund

Aims/priorities: Virgin Money Foundation are on a mission to support community regeneration by backing people who can



make big changes happen locally. Virgin Money Foundation would love to support projects:

Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund

Aims/priorities: The Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund is a registered charity and was established to promote, enhance, improve and protect both the natural and built environment in the local community. To be successful a group must:



- Carry out positive work in the community and be of charitable nature and be not for profit status
- Be community, socially or environmentally focused
- Based within the area of benefit

The project should offer / be:

- Improve, enhance, protect and conserve the natural and built environment; or offer heritage conservation
- Promote or advance social welfare
- Provide better appreciation of the natural and urban environment
- Create a safe habitat for flora and fauna
- Demonstrate lasting benefit to the community
- Benefit all members of the community regardless of race, gender or religion

- Be from an established group or charity able to demonstrate clear banking or financial records, and not an individual or commercial organisation working for profit

Who can apply? Community groups and charities that are approximately within a 10-mile radius of the Airport, concentrating on the areas most exposed to aircraft noise

Grant amount: Grants of up to £3,000 are available

Application process: There is an online application form

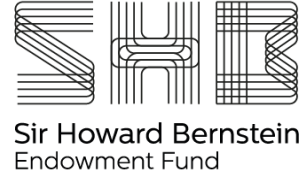

The Manchester's Rising Stars Fund (proudly supported by the Sir Howard Bernstein Endowment Fund)



Aims/priorities: The Manchester's Rising Stars Fund (proudly supported by the Sir Howard Bernstein Endowment Fund) aims to give young Mancunians a helping hand to allow them to take opportunities that may otherwise be out of their reach. With 4 in 10 of Manchester's children growing up in poverty, many young people face profound disadvantages as they try to succeed. Many agencies and organisations in Manchester offer practical support and assistance. But sometimes, a financial grant to pay for something which will help a young person to take a step forward towards their goal is what it takes to enable progress. Requests can be made from 16 – 24 years olds (or up to 30 years old if they have personal experience of homelessness) to purchase equipment, to fund courses and accreditations, and to support other costs relating to moving into employment, education or training. The Fund will only consider requests which come from young people whose financial or family circumstances put them at a disadvantage as they start their adult life. The Fund will only support proposals which can make a sustainable difference rather than a fleeting benefit.

Who can apply? 16 – 24 years olds (or up to 30 years old if they have personal experience of homelessness)

Grant amount: Grants of between £200 – £2,000 are available

Application process: An application form can be downloaded from the website. Applicants need the recommendation of a referee who can support your application. (This could be e.g. a social worker, tutor, Leaving Care Worker, counsellor, family support worker etc.).

Manchester Wellbeing Fund

Aims/priorities: In January 2017, Greater Manchester Mental Health NHS Foundation Trust (GMMH) embarked on an ambitious programme of clinical service transformation to improve the mental health outcomes for people receiving their services and to support the wider mental wellbeing of Manchester citizens. Part of this vision for Manchester services involves building community support to promote mental wellbeing (feeling good and functioning well) and support people living with mental health conditions in the community. A budget of £1.5m has been allocated for the three-year Manchester Wellbeing Fund, for community groups and GMMH service users who have great ideas about how to support their communities. The main objectives of the Fund are:

- to develop community support around people's mental health needs

- to promote mental health and wellbeing
- to challenge the stigma around mental illness

Who can apply? The Fund is for groups and service users who are passionate about mental wellbeing in their communities. It is designed to support individual projects rather than provide core funding for organisations.

Application process: Applicants need to first complete an Expression Form online. For grants of up to £500 applicants will only have to submit an Expression of Interest.

Aims/priorities: Neighbourhood Investment Funds are available to communities to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. £20,000 of neighbourhood investment funding is available to every area (ward) in Manchester each year – to help groups carry out events and activities that benefit people in their local neighbourhood.

Who can apply? The fund is open to established groups, voluntary groups and other community groups, as well as groups of residents working together for the first time. School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Grant amount: Applications should not exceed £10,000

Application process: There is an online application form

Arts Council – Creative People and Places

Aims/priorities: The funding aims to support new and different approaches to developing cultural programmes that deliver excellent experiences, genuinely engage people in shaping provision and involve a variety of partners. The central aims of the fund are:



- Communities are empowered to take the lead in shaping local cultural provision
- More people from the identified places of least engagement experience, create and are inspired by arts and culture, and become regularly engaged as audiences or participants
- The aspiration of excellence is central to the activity we will support – this covers both excellence of art and culture and excellence of the process of engaging communities

- To learn from past experiences (including learning from the current Creative People and Places programme) and create an environment where the arts and cultural sector can experiment with innovative approaches to engaging communities
- To learn more about how to establish sustainable arts and cultural opportunities and make this learning freely available across the cultural sector
- To encourage partnerships across the subsidised, amateur, voluntary, and commercial sectors
- Through these projects, the power of arts and culture will be demonstrated to enrich the lives of individuals and make positive changes in communities
- Activity will be radically different from what has happened before in the eligible places prior to the Creative People and Places programme
- To maximise opportunities for collaborations across arts organisations, museums and libraries where possible
- Where possible and appropriate, to maximise digital opportunities for cultural engagement and empowering the public

Who can apply? Applications for funding will only be accepted from organisations working as a consortium.
