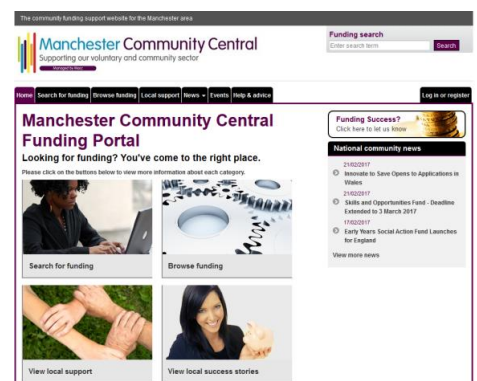

VCSE organisations working outside of the City of Manchester, consultants, sole traders, statutory bodies, private businesses and infrastructure organisations who become members of Macc aren't eligible to access our funding portal. Aims/priorities: The funding can help all target those aged 15 and over, from the hardest to reach communities who are out of work but especially those that:

- Are homeless or at risk of being homeless
- Have low or no qualification
- Lack literacy and numeracy skills
- Are lone parents
- Have disabilities, learning difficulties or health conditions
- Are women
- Are from ethnic minorities
- Are aged over 50

Funding must target people who face additional barriers in the workplace to improve their employability and gain permanent employment.

Who can apply? All eligible voluntary, community and social enterprises across Greater Manchester

Grant amount: Small grants of up to £20,000 are available from June 2019 and May 2021

Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund

Aims/priorities: The Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund is a registered charity and was established to promote, enhance, improve and protect both the natural and built environment in the local community. To be successful a group must:



- Carry out positive work in the community and be of charitable nature and be not for profit status
- Be community, socially or environmentally focused
- Based within the area of benefit

The project should offer / be:

- Improve, enhance, protect and conserve the natural and built environment; or offer heritage conservation
- Promote or advance social welfare

Manchester Wellbeing Fund

Aims/priorities: In January 2017, Greater Manchester Mental Health NHS Foundation Trust (GMMH) embarked on an ambitious programme of clinical service

transformation to improve the mental health outcomes for people receiving their services and to



support the wider mental wellbeing of Manchester citizens. Part of this vision for Manchester services involves building community support to promote mental wellbeing (feeling good and functioning well) and support people living with mental health conditions in the community. A budget of £1.5m has been allocated for the three-year Manchester Wellbeing Fund, for community groups and GMMH service users who have great ideas about how to support their communities.

The main objectives of the Fund are:

- to develop community support around people's mental health needs
- to promote mental health and wellbeing
- to challenge the stigma around mental illness

Who can apply? The Fund is for groups and service users who are passionate about mental wellbeing in their communities. It is designed to support individual projects rather than provide core funding for organisations.

Grant amount: Grants of between £250 and £3,000 are available

Application process: Applicants need to first complete an Expression Form online. For grants of up to £500 applicants will only have to submit an Expression of Interest.

Near Neighbours

Aims/priorities: Near Neighbours brings people together from communities that are religiously and ethnically diverse,

so that they can get to know each other better, build relationships of trust and collaborate together on initiatives that improve the local community they live in. There are two key objectives:

- Social interaction – to develop positive relationships in multi-faith and multi-ethnic areas i.e. to help people from different faiths and ethnicities get to know and understand each other better
- Social action – to encourage people of different faiths and of no faith and of different ethnicities to come together for initiatives that improve their local neighbourhood

Who can apply? Faith groups, places of worship, partnerships of different faith groups, and informal local groups comprising people of different faith groups. Secular organisations that are working with faith communities. Projects must run in one of these eligible areas: Manchester, Rochdale, Bury and Oldham.

Grant amount: Grants of between £250 and £5,000 are available

Aims/priorities: Neighbourhood Investment Funds are available to communities to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. £20,000 of neighbourhood investment funding is available to every area (ward) in Manchester each year – to help groups carry out events and activities that benefit people in their local neighbourhood.

Who can apply? The fund is open to established groups, voluntary groups and other community groups, as well as groups of residents working together for the first time. School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Grant amount: Applications should not exceed £10,000

Application process: There is an online application form

Aims/priorities: If you are a member of a community group or have a project that needs funding, apply to pitch at one of One Manchester's upcoming Community

Soups. Applications are once again open for the latest round of Community Soups, and One Manchester want to hear from you if your project can make a difference in their neighbourhoods. This could be by making the most of local resources or public spaces, addressing environmental issues or helping improve people's wellbeing. One Manchester want everyone in their communities to have the opportunity to access positive activities that promote health and wellbeing, bring the community together and help reduce loneliness and isolation.

Who can apply? Community groups

Application process: There is an online application form. Applications are assessed internally for shortlisting and are judged on how well the project aligns with One Manchester's vision, whether the project is sustainable and how well the project demonstrates social innovation. You must be



available for the right date to pitch for your areas if your project gets shortlisted. One Manchester will provide help to get your four-minute pitch ready for the community audience. The pitches then get voted on by local people in the audience and the successful projects will be given funding.

Marsh Christian Trust

Aims/priorities: The Marsh Christian Trust is a grant-making trust established in 1981 by Brian Marsh. The Trust is based on the Christian



principles of reaching out, caring for the natural world and helping those in need. These principles remain a core part of the charity's ethos and it provides support on this basis which is distinctly inclusive of all organisations, including those of other faiths or no faith. Grant recipients come from all walks of life and are respected for who they are and what they are doing, not what faith they follow. The grants are intended to support small registered charities through long-term core funding, in an attempt to assist these organisations to maintain their current and on-going activities. The Trustees wish to engage in long-term support, in the form of money given on a recurring annual basis subject to yearly re-submission and review. Literature, Arts and Heritage – although the Trust maintains strong links with a number of national organisations (i.e., the National Portrait Gallery and the British Museum) it also works with a great variety of smaller, local organisations that aim to improve public appreciation and participation in literature, the arts and heritage.

Who can apply? Grants are available for UK registered charities

Grant amount: Grants range from £250 to £4,000 with new applications at the lower end of this scale

Application process: The Trust does not have a standard application form. All applications should be made in writing and sent by post to the Trust. The application should consist of a cover

letter of roughly one to two sides, and a full set of the most recent audited accounts should be enclosed.

Deadline: There is no deadline for receipt of applications. Applications are processed on an on-going basis and are usually administered within three months of receipt.

The funding is targeted at projects to find practical ways to help disadvantaged individuals return to the community through training or residential facility provision, rather than merely providing short term shelter.



Who can apply? This fund is aimed at supporting small and medium-sized registered charities with an annual turnover of under £1 million and with unrestricted reserves of under six months annual running costs based on their latest published annual accounts

Grant amount: Grants of up to £5,000 are available.

ENVIRONMENT

SUEZ Communities Trust Landfill Communities Fund – Smaller Projects Fund (England)



Aims/priorities: Public Amenities – Funding is available for projects, which provide, maintain or improve an amenity that is used primarily for leisure and recreation. To be eligible for funding under this object projects must:

- Have unrestricted public access for a minimum of 104 days per year; that is no less than four evenings or 2 days each week or 12 full weeks each year
- Be used primarily for the purpose of leisure and recreation
- Be available to all sections of the community

Biodiversity – (Object DA): Funding is available for projects, which conserve biodiversity through the provision, conservation, restoration or enhancement of a natural habitat or the maintenance or recovery of a species in its natural habitat. To be eligible for funding under this object projects must:

- Undertake physical works to provide, conserve, restore or enhance a terrestrial habitat or species present on the list of priority species in England and Wales (Sections 41 & 42 of the Natural Environment and Rural Communities Act 2006)
- Allocate at least 90% of projects total cost to the practical, onsite delivery of biodiversity conservation work to benefit the single priority species or habitat i.e. materials, contractor costs, machinery hire etc.

- Take place at a single site

Historic Buildings, Structures or Sites – (Object E): Funding is available for projects which include maintaining, repairing or restoring a building, other structure or a site of archaeological interest which is a place of religious worship, or a site of historic or architectural or archaeological interest and is open to the public. To be eligible for funding under this object projects must:

- Be Grade One listed if the site is a place of worship
- Be Grade One, Two or Three listed or have another significant heritage designation i.e. Scheduled Ancient Monument
- Be open for a similar amount of time as would be expected from similar buildings or structures. For example, a place of religious worship would be expected to be open for religious worship on its primary day of worship

Who can apply? To be eligible, applicants must be run on a not-for-profit basis. This could include community groups, parish councils, charities, community interest companies, sports clubs, community associations, local authorities and voluntary organisations.

Grant amount: Grants of between £1 and £20,000 are available. Projects must have an overall cost of no more than £40,000.

Grant amount: The Foundation typically makes around 150 grants in a year with a total value of between £750,000 and £800,000. The maximum grant is £15,000, and the average grant is between £5,000 and £6,000. The Foundation makes single grants, or grants split over two or three years.

Wakeham Trust

Aims/priorities: Funding is available for projects that are small scale and would find it hard to get funding from big trusts, or are currently unfashionable or unpopular among mainstream funders, but are making a real contribution to the local community. The Trust will consider the following when looking at what to fund:



- Is it something new for this particular area? It doesn't matter if the idea is tried and tested in other parts of the country, if it is new for a particular community it may be of interest to the Trust.
- Is it small? Grants are normally given to projects where an initial £125 to £2,500 can make a real difference. Generally the Trust will look at what it is costing per head to reach the people the project is helping
- Will it find it hard to get support elsewhere? The Trust tries to help those projects that are too new and experimental to get support through established fundraising channels, or which (if established) are under threat due to changes in national or local policy
- Is it run by ordinary people, not professionals? Once a project is big enough to employ staff, it is probably too big for the Trust to fund. The Trust also likes to support projects that empower ordinary non-professional people
- Does it have the potential to become self-supporting? The Trust likes to see information that shows how the project will support itself in future years or (if it is a short-life project) over the course of its life
- Is it outward looking, rather than being focused on its own members? The Trust is especially interested in supporting groups who are usually considered recipients of voluntary action (for example old age pensioners, refugees or young offenders) when these people become involved in helping other groups in the community as this empowers the volunteers themselves, as well as supporting the project they are working on

Who can apply? Grants are available to registered charities, community and voluntary groups in the UK to support small-scale projects with a community emphasis that would find it hard to obtain funding elsewhere

Grant amount: Funding is at the discretion of the Trustees. However, as a guide, grants are normally given to projects where an initial £125 to £2,500 will make a real difference

CRASH

Aims/priorities: The aim is to refurbish and develop facilities for the homeless to a much higher standard than would otherwise be possible.



CRASH does this by:

- Offering free of charge professional expertise
- Offering sourcing building materials and the technical knowledge to use them
- Awarding cash grants (ranging from £5,000 to £50,000)
- Homelessness and hospice charities are eligible to apply. Organisations must be a registered UK charity with the Charity Commission in England, Wales or Northern Ireland or a registered Scottish Charity

The charity must have a legal interest in the building in question, unless the application is relating to professional advice regarding a building the charity is considering leasing or buying.

- Homelessness charities are eligible for support if they own the Freehold on the building, or have a lease with a minimum of five years left to run
- Hospices are eligible for support if they own the Freehold on the building, or have a lease with a minimum of ten years left to run

Who can apply? Grants and other support are available to homelessness charities and hospice charities in the UK for construction related projects

Aims/priorities: The funding is for projects, which will create or improve opportunities to play sport and get active in local communities. Grants do not have to be used for a traditional space or traditional sport. Examples of eligible project locations include: canal towpaths, woodlands and open spaces with the potential to be used and enjoyed as part of an active lifestyle. The funding is available as:

- Small Scale Investments – to cover the cost of emergency works due to something like storm or flood damage, or something totally unexpected that is stopping people from being able to stay active right now
- Medium Scale Investments – to make more substantial changes. This might be an upgrade to an existing facility or developing a new space in the community
- Large Scale Investments – for projects, which can demonstrate a considerable impact or are targeting under-represented groups. (To be eligible for funding applicants must not have received funding from Sport England previously)

Who can apply? Grants are available for community organisations, sports clubs, statutory bodies and educational establishments to enhance local community spaces which encourage people to play sport and get active

Grant amount: Three levels of funding are available:

- Small Scale Investments – Typically ranging between £1,000 and £15,000
- Medium Scale Investments – Typically ranging between £15,000 and 50,000
- Large Scale Investments – Typically ranging between £50,000 and £150,000

Sport England expect to make mainly small and medium scale investments as they can make a significant difference to an organisation and the community it serves.
