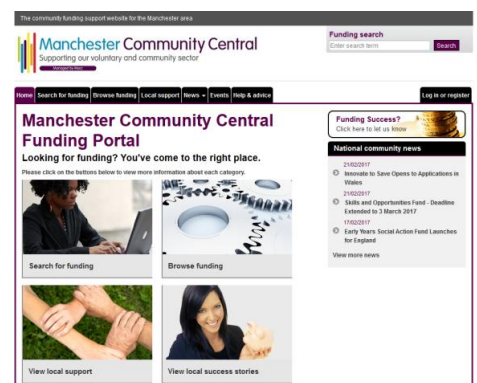

VCSE organisations working outside of the City of Manchester, consultants, sole traders, statutory bodies, private businesses and infrastructure organisations who become members of Macc aren't eligible to access our funding portal. Ford Britain Trust pay special attention to projects focusing on education, environment, children, the disabled, youth activities and projects that provide clear benefits to the local communities close to their UK locations, which includes Manchester. Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund

Aims/priorities: The Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund is a registered charity and was established to promote, enhance, improve and protect both the natural and built environment in the local community. To be successful a group must:



- Carry out positive work in the community and be of charitable nature and be not for profit status
- Be community, socially or environmentally focused
- Based within the area of benefit

The project should offer / be:

- Improve, enhance, protect and conserve the natural and built environment; or offer heritage conservation
- Promote or advance social welfare
- Provide better appreciation of the natural and urban environment
- Create a safe habitat for flora and fauna
- Demonstrate lasting benefit to the community
- Benefit all members of the community regardless of race, gender or religion

- Be from an established group or charity able to demonstrate clear banking or financial records, and not an individual or commercial organisation working for profit

Who can apply? Community groups and charities that are approximately within a 10-mile radius of the Airport, concentrating on the areas most exposed to aircraft noise

Grant amount: Grants of up to £3,000 are available

Aims/priorities: The majority of grants awarded are for individuals. Grants may be made for the relief of people living in the City of Manchester, Salford or Trafford who are on low income and are sick, convalescent or disabled, which are calculated to alleviate their suffering or assist in their recovery. Funding for community projects: The Trustees may also consider applications from registered charities or voluntary organisations for specific community projects or pieces of work. Trustees are flexible in what they award a grant for. The need must be specific and help to alleviate the beneficiaries' suffering whether this is financial or medical relief. Your application should detail a specific project or piece of work which your organisation provides as part of its overall service delivery. Projects funded must be delivered within the next 12 months.

Who can apply? Individuals. Funding for community projects: Registered charities or voluntary organisations that provide assistance to residents living in Manchester, Salford or Trafford. Beneficiaries must be in financial need and have a medical condition or be recovering from a condition which impacts on their ability to provide the items requested for themselves.

Aims/priorities: Neighbourhood Investment Funds are available to communities to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. £20,000 of neighbourhood investment funding is available to every area



(ward) in Manchester each year – to help groups carry out events and activities that benefit people in their local neighbourhood.

Who can apply? The fund is open to established groups, voluntary groups and other community groups, as well as groups of residents working together for the first time. School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Grant amount: Applications should not exceed £10,000

Application process: There is an online application form

Deadline: Applications can be submitted at any time

Who can apply? The current UK strategy for the foundation works around six priorities, these are:

- To support imaginative people to nurture exciting ideas
- To widen access and participation in the arts
- To improve people's education and learning through the arts
- To show that the arts make a difference to people's lives
- To support the development and growth of organisations investing in young people and positive change
- To improve support for young people who migrate, and strengthen integration so that communities can live well together

Aims/priorities: The Austin and Hope

Pilkington Trust award grants to projects that

address specific categories set out by the trust each year. The category for 2019 is Children and Young People. Some of the other focuses of the trust are Arts and Culture, Community, Health and Social Care and Older People. Grants are awarded four times per year.

Who can apply? The Austin and Hope Pilkington Trust gives grants to registered charities that work in the UK. In 2019, priority is being given to projects focusing on child exploitation, mentoring and support and clubs and activities. We will also prioritise awarding grants to projects that address mental health. To apply for this grant you must meet the following criteria:

- Your project must relate to children aged between 0 and 11
- Your charity's operating income and operating expenditure must be a minimum of £100,000 and a maximum of £1,000,000

Grant amount? Grants of up to £1,000 are available

Application process: There is an online application form

Deadline: Grant round 2 opens on 1 April and runs until 30 April. Grant round 3 opens from the 1 of July and runs until 31 July. Grant round 4 opens from the 1 September and runs until 30 September

Kellogg's Breakfast Club Grants Programme

Aims/priorities: Kellogg's has teamed up with Forever Manchester to award grants to school Breakfast Clubs, to help them provide breakfast to those children who need it most.

Who can apply? Your breakfast club must be based in a school



In England, Wales, Scotland or Northern Ireland. Priority will be given to schools that have either: 35% and above of children eligible for pupil premium funding and/or eligible for free school meals OR Schools that are based in an area which is classified as falling in the 10% of most deprived areas according to the index of Multiple Deprivation. Additionally, if your school has received breakfast club funding from Gregg's or Magic Breakfast within the current academic year, your club will not be considered a priority for support. Only one grant per school in each academic year is available.

Magdalen Hospital Trust

Aims/priorities: The Trust offers grants to promote the welfare of young people, under the age of 25 years, who suffer from various effects of social deprivation, abuse, mental and physical handicap, inadequate housing, lack of education or training, and the problems derived from unemployment and broken families. The Trust prefers to fund project costs rather than core costs. Funding is available for the following:

- Projects that provide training for work and personal development
- Clubs
- Crime prevention
- Emergency care
- Play schemes
- Mental health support and counselling

Who can apply? Charities registered in the UK with an annual income of less than £150,000 can apply. The preferred area of works of work are small community groups, with an element of trained volunteers, and self-help, who are carrying out practical work in front line situations.

Grant amount: Grants tend to range from £500 - £2,000

Application process: There is an online application form

St. James Place Charitable Foundation

Aims/Priorities: Since its formation in 1992, the Charitable Foundation has aimed to make a positive and lasting change to the lives of children and young people. Supporting young people is still our largest focus area, although today our work stretches across three main themes:

- Supporting Young People – Special Needs/Disadvantaged (aged up to 25 years)
- Combatting cancer (all ages)
- Supporting hospices (all ages)

Approximately 80% of the money raised goes to supporting UK charities, with the remaining 20% being allocated to charities overseas, particularly those helping children and young people to escape poverty, malnutrition and neglect. The Overseas grants programme is open via invitation only through the St. James's Place Community.

Who can apply? Charities who support disadvantaged and disabled young people under the age of 25 in a number of areas, including:

- Young people with physical or mental health difficulties or life threatening or degenerative conditions
- Young carers
- Young people who are socially or economically disadvantaged

Grant amount: Small grants of up to £10,000 to UK Registered Charities with an annual income of up to £1,000,000 (this income restriction does not apply to Special Needs Schools or Mainstream Schools with a Special Needs Unit)

Deadline: There are no deadlines or closing dates. Small Grants are considered on receipt and in rotation

Aims/Priorities: The Bright ideas fund supports new community business ideas through the start-up and planning stages with tailored business support up to the implementation stage. The Bright Ideas fund is funded by

Power to Change, the independent trust supporting community business in England, and delivered



by Locality, the national network for community organisations, in partnership with Cooperatives UK, the Plunkett Foundation and Groundwork UK.

Who can apply? To be eligible to apply for the Bright Ideas Fund you must:

- Be setting up a community business
- Be based in England
- Be an incorporated or unincorporated organisation, but not an individual
- Have been established for five years or less
- Have a charitable purpose
- Ensure your idea is for community benefit
- Share Power to Change's impact goals
- Make your community business accessible and inclusive

Grant amount: Grants of up to £15,000 are available

Trusthouse Charitable Foundation

Aims/priorities: Trusthouse gives grants for running costs or one-off capital costs to charities and not-for-

profit organisations in accordance with criteria that are regularly reviewed and decided by the trustees. The overarching themes are Rural Issues and Urban Deprivation. Within these overarching themes they are interested in two areas: Community Support and Arts, Education and Heritage.

Who can apply? Smaller charitable and not-for-profit organisations within the UK, with a total annual income under £500,000, who work in the most deprived urban areas or the most remote and socio-economically deprived rural areas. Major Grants Programme – Open to any eligible organisation with a total annual income under £500,000. Small Grants programme – Open to any eligible organisation with a total annual income under £250,000.

Grant Amount: Single year grants are available between £7,500 and £20,000. Multi-year grants are available between £7,500 and £20,000 per annum. Single year grants are available between £2,000 and £7,500.

Who can apply? Projects that encourage wider support of the categories listed above. Projects where grants of between £1,000 and £3,000 will make a quantifiable difference. Grassroots initiatives are looked on favourably.

Grant amount: Most grants are between £1,000 and £3,000. However, a handful of larger grants are awarded each year, but these are usually reserved for Quaker-based causes.

Application process: An application form can be found on the website

Deadline: No application deadlines and charities can apply at any time during the year. However, requests for more than £3,000 must be assessed by a trustee sub-group before going for a full trustee meeting. At present, these larger grants are only considered at March and November meetings. Sub groups meet roughly every two to three months.

Rank Foundation – ‘Pebbles’ Small Grants Programme



Aims/priorities: The Small Appeals Programme is administered and provided by the Rank Foundation. Funding is available for charities and churches for projects that benefit UK residents in UK communities. This fund is aimed at smaller charities that may not be covered by the Rank Foundation’s larger programmes. Funding is available for:

- A particular project for which the mainstay is capital costs - building work, refurbishment or the purchase of long-term equipment
- A one-off short term activity, such as an annual respite break or holiday for disadvantaged young people

Please be aware that the Trustees are only able to make a contribution to the project costs through this funding scheme. Applicants need to have already raised a third of the total costs to ensure that the project will go ahead with their contribution.

Who can apply? Registered charities with an annual income of less than £500,000

Grant amount: No maximum amount stated as this is dependent on the number of applications received. The most commonly donated amount is £1000. The Rank Foundation will only consider one application per year.

LGBT + Futures Fund Small Grants Programme

Aims/priorities: The LGBT Consortium is working with the Government Equalities Office (GEO) to setup, manage and distribute small grants to LGBT+ organisations across England. The funding available will look to fund locally based interventions that support and increase the visibility of diverse LGBT+ people & communities, those focussed on sustainability, and those that address the findings of the GEO's National LGBT Survey.

Who can apply? Any non-profit organisation whose primary focus is Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Trans + (LGBT +) communities is welcome to apply. The LGBT Consortium recognize that some organisations will only focus on part of those communities. Applicants do not need to be a member
