Please note: To be eligible to access our funding portal you must be a VCSE organisation working in



the City of Manchester with at least 50% of your beneficiaries in the City of Manchester. VCSE organisations working outside of the City of Manchester, consultants, sole traders, statutory bodies, private businesses and infrastructure organisations who become members of Macc aren't eligible to access our funding portal. Manchester Wellbeing Fund

Aims/priorities: In January 2017, Greater Manchester Mental Health NHS Foundation Trust (GMMH) embarked on an ambitious programme of clinical service



transformation to improve the mental health outcomes for people receiving their services and to support the wider mental wellbeing of Manchester citizens. Part of this vision for Manchester services involves building community support to promote mental wellbeing (feeling good and functioning well) and support people living with mental health conditions in the community. A budget of £1.5m has been allocated for the three-year Manchester Wellbeing Fund, for community groups and GMMH service users who have great ideas about how to support their communities. The main objectives of the Fund are:

- to develop community support around people's mental health needs
- to promote mental health and wellbeing
- to challenge the stigma around mental illness

Who can apply? The Fund is for groups and service users who are passionate about mental wellbeing in their communities. It is designed to support individual projects rather than provide core funding for organisations.

Grant amount: Grants of between £250 and £3,000 are available

Application process: Applicants need to first complete an Expression Form online. For grants of up to £500 applicants will only have to submit an Expression of Interest.

Manchester Work Club Funding Programme

Aims/priorities: The aim of Manchester Work Club

Grant Funding is to contribute to Manchester City

Council's priority of increasing the number of Manchester residents who are working. It will:



- Provide an opportunity for established Work Clubs in Manchester to undertake initiatives, short projects or increase resources to improve outcomes for their clients. Specifically, this funding is to undertake activities that will improve the quality and quantity of services provided to Work Club clients
- Support Manchester Work Clubs to build their resources with the aim of becoming financially more sustainable

Based on a review of current provision, Manchester City Council are looking to fund new groups currently not in receipt of their work club funding, to ensure geographical coverage and support to communities of interest. However, if you are in receipt of MCC funding you may apply but will need to demonstrate how this funding will be used to provide support over and above what is already being funded. Any additional funding will be monitored separately. Manchester City Council are looking to fund work club settings that:

- Develop or maintain partnerships/work collaboratively with other employment support and training providers, such as other Work Clubs, programmes such as Working Well and employers
- Work with partners who are delivering other funded employment support/skills activity and, where appropriate, refer onto further education provision such as MAES, The Manchester College, and Skills Support for Employment
- Promote Apprenticeships
- Use the Our Manchester Approach to support residents with a wider range of issues surrounding work, i.e. housing, emotional support, mental health

Who can apply? To be eligible to apply, organisations must be:

- Not-for-profit: voluntary and community organisations, social enterprises, co-operatives and mutual societies, Community Interest Companies, charities i.e. non-governmental organisations which are value driven and which principally invest their surpluses to further social, environmental or cultural objectives
- Based in the City of Manchester and currently delivering Work Club activity to Manchester residents

available to communities to make their neighbourhoods better places to live. £20,000 of neighbourhood investment funding is available to every area (ward) in Manchester each year – to help groups carry out events and activities that benefit people in their local neighbourhood.

Who can apply? The fund is open to established groups, voluntary groups and other community groups, as well as groups of residents working together for the first time. School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Grant amount: Applications should not exceed £10,000

Who can apply? Individual artists, community and cultural organisations

Grant amount: The Arts Council typically make awards of between £1,000 and £100,000. The Arts Council will fund up to a maximum of 90% of the cost of a project, meaning that at least 10% of the cost must come from other sources





Aims/priorities: Grants are for local projects that support community integration or local delivery of services. Community Integration projects should create strong local links between the Armed Forces community,



who are current and former members of their armed forces and their families) and civilian communities; and be able to clearly demonstrate how they will have impact in overcoming barriers to better integration; and improving perceptions, attitudes and understanding. For the project to be truly effective in achieving community integration there should be shared development, delivery and benefits for both communities. Delivery of Local Services projects should be local projects which offer financial advice, housing, mental and physical health, employability or social support

for serving armed forces personnel, veterans, and their families. Projects must be well connected, both to their beneficiaries and to other relevant organisations, and be able to demonstrate how the services they provide will be well-publicised, accessible and joined up.
