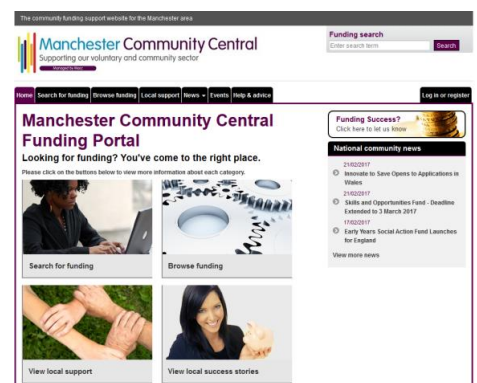

VCSE organisations working outside of the City of Manchester, consultants, sole traders, statutory bodies, private businesses and infrastructure organisations who become members of Macc aren't eligible to access our funding portal. Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund

Aims/priorities: The Manchester Airport Community Trust Fund is a registered charity and was established to promote, enhance, improve and protect both the natural and built environment in the local community. To be successful a group must:

Manchester Wellbeing Fund

Aims/priorities: In January 2017, Greater Manchester Mental Health NHS Foundation Trust (GMMH) embarked on an ambitious programme of clinical service transformation to improve the mental health outcomes for people receiving their services and to support the wider mental wellbeing of Manchester citizens. Part of this vision for Manchester services involves building community support to promote mental wellbeing (feeling good and functioning well) and support people living with mental health conditions in the community. A budget of £1.5m has been allocated for the three-year Manchester Wellbeing Fund, for community groups and GMMH service users who have great ideas about how to support their communities. The main objectives of the Fund are:

- to develop community support around people's mental health needs
- to promote mental health and wellbeing
- to challenge the stigma around mental illness

Who can apply? The Fund is for groups and service users who are passionate about mental wellbeing in their communities. It is designed to support individual projects rather than provide core funding for organisations.

Grant amount: Grants of between £250 and £3,000 are available

Application process: Applicants need to first complete an Expression Form online. For grants of up to £500 applicants will only have to submit an Expression of Interest.

Near Neighbours



Aims/priorities: Near Neighbours brings people together from communities that are religiously and ethnically diverse, so that they can get to know each other better, build relationships of trust and collaborate together on initiatives that improve the local community they live in. There are two key objectives:

- Social interaction – to develop positive relationships in multi-faith and multi-ethnic areas i.e. to help people from different faiths and ethnicities get to know and understand each other better
- Social action – to encourage people of different faiths and of no faith and of different ethnicities to come together for initiatives that improve their local neighbourhood

Who can apply? Faith groups, places of worship, partnerships of different faith groups, and informal local groups comprising people of different faith groups. Secular organisations that are working with faith communities. Projects must run in one of these eligible areas: Manchester, Rochdale, Bury and Oldham.

Grant amount: Grants of between £250 and £5,000 are available

School Parent Teacher Associations can also apply if they have the support of local residents and parents and the project benefits the wider community as well as the school.

Aims/priorities: To help young people have a say in how community spaces are managed. The #iwill Fund supports the aim of the #iwill campaign to make social action part of life for as many 10 to 20 year-olds as possible, forming a habit of community involvement they will continue as adults.

Community spaces are (or could be) open to members of the public. This might include places



where young people interact with services and institutions, places that young people struggle to access or use in the way that they would like and/or where young people's voices aren't currently represented. Trusthouse Charitable Foundation

Aims/priorities: Trusthouse is interested in applications for capital projects at community centres in the most deprived urban areas and village halls in remote and economically. 'Community centres' is interpreted in the broad sense and so can include; churches, sports facilities or other

buildings which offer a range of activities throughout the week which all the community can access.

Who can apply? UK based organisations and projects, which are based rurally in the most deprived 50% of the Index of Multiple Deprivations

Grant amount: Single year grants between £7,500 and £20,000 for core costs, salaries, running and project costs. Multi-year (maximum three years) grants between £7,500 and 20,000 per annum for core costs, salaries, running or project costs. Grants between £7,500 and £60,000 for one-off capital costs, where the total project cost does not exceed £2 million.

Transform Foundation



Aims/priorities: The Transform Foundation's

goals are simple: to provide the initial funding to small and mid-size charities to help them prove the potential of online marketing as a way of recruiting donors, volunteers, campaigners or helping beneficiaries. The commercial sector spends 45% of budgets on online advertising versus charities that spend 2%. Funding for digital is hard to come by: many funders are not geared up for funding digital, so that is what Transformation Foundation do. Transforming Places Through Heritage Programme – Project Development Grants



Aims/priorities: Grants are available to help fund development costs of projects that will create alternative uses for redundant or underused, community-owned historic buildings in town centres. Projects must be located in England, in places that are or have the potential to be a hub for their community, providing services to a wide catchment population. They will typically include a variety of uses, including retail, and be recognised by local people as their town centre or high street. This includes:

- Distinct town centres and high streets within large cities
- Rural settlements that are notable centres within a district, providing services for a wide hinterland that includes smaller villages. (Small village high streets will not qualify)

Eligible locations must already be the focus of a wider strategy or initiative – a place-based initiative – which aims to revitalise the high street or town centre and is likely to be led by the local authority, neighbourhood planning group or a community-led organisation, such as a civic society or community land trust. (This could include Future High Streets Fund, Heritage Action Zone or Neighbourhood Plan)

Who can apply? Applications are accepted from any of the following non-profit organisations:

- Charitable Incorporated Organisations (CIOs or SCIOs)
- Charitable Companies Limited by Guarantee
- Charitable Community Benefit Societies
- Community Benefit Societies
- Not-for-private-profit Companies Limited by Guarantee
- Community Interest Companies (CICs) Limited by Guarantee
- Co-operatives
- Parish and Town Councils

Grant amount: Grants of up to £1,000,000 are available for up to 90% of the cost of work involved. There is an overall limit of £150,000 on the total funding available for developing any one project. Organisations can only apply to one grant category at any one time but may apply for further grants on completion of the funded work (subject to the overall limit).

Application process: An online application form is available to complete on the website. Applicants can also submit an initial enquiry form if they would like to check their project will fit the scope of the programme's funding or would like further advice. AHF strongly encourages applicants to discuss any potential application with the relevant Support Officer in their area before submitting an application.

OLDER PEOPLE

The Yapp Charitable Trust
