FUNDING FOR HERITAGE RELATED PROJECTS

This leaflet suggests some of the grant giving organisations which may be able to help with funding for heritage related repair projects. It is not a definitive list but is intended as a starting point for anyone starting to investigate funding sources.



Repair Grants for Heritage At Risk

Funding for work which needs to be carried out within two years to prevent loss or damage to important architectural, archaeological or landscape features. Usually for Grade I and II* Buildings At Risk. Typically grants range from £10,000 for development upto £250,000 for repairs, if dealt with regionally. Larger grants are dealt with nationally.

Regional Capacity Building

Funding for individual projects carried out by groups and organisations including core revenue costs of voluntary, not for profit or charitable organisations, specific projects, stand alone studies, training to third parties. Grants are usually for smaller amounts than RGHAR.

Management Agreements for Field Monuments

To maintain and manage ancient monuments.

Partnership Schemes in Conservation Areas

Partnerships with local councils for work in conservation areas at risk. Contact the local office for details .

Early Stage Grants to test viability & develop projects:

a. Project Viability Grants – up to £3000, 6 months delivery, for not for profit organisations b. Project Development Grants – up to £20,000 for not for profit organisations c. Cold Spots Grants (up to £5k for project development of industrial buildings)

Loans:

- Acquisition (up to £500k @ 7% over 3 years)
- Project development (up to £50k @ 2.5% over 18 months)
- Working capital (up to £500k @ 5% over 3 years)

Project Viability Grants:

Funding available to help meet professional fees e.g. AHF Project Viability Grants (up to £3000) and HLF Start Up Grants (£3000-£10,000)



Foundation funds voluntary and charitable organisations, supporting projects in the area of heritage and conservation among other categories, including capital projects. Applications throughout the year.
